Executive Summary

The Canadian County for Children and Families is pleased to present the 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). The CHNA provides an overview of the health needs and priorities within Canadian County. This collaborative coalition group has identified this geographic area as its focus community. This report aims to provide residents with a deeper understanding of the health challenges they face and to guide planning efforts and the development of an implementation strategy to address these concerns.

The CHNA involved a review of both quantitative and qualitative data, as well as state and local data, to attain the full scope of the community's needs as they pertain to health, emphasizing the economically poor and underserved populations. Input came from a community listening session, an online survey, stakeholders, and some key informant interviews in which specific populations were targeted. The community provided us with a comprehensive view of the current health concerns, both real and perceived, that influence the health of Canadian County.

Key Findings

Both primary and secondary data were analyzed and integrated to identify the most critical health concerns and needs in Canadian County. These needs encompass various domains and are frequently interconnected:

1. Obesity

- Increasing rates of overweight and obesity in both adults and children.
- Limited access to affordable opportunities for physical activity.
- High consumption of processed foods due to cost and availability.

2. Smoking

- High prevalence of tobacco use among adults compared to state averages.
- Increased risk of chronic diseases such as lung cancer and heart disease.
- More smoking cessation resources and community education programs are needed.

3. Mental Health

- Shortage of mental health professionals leading to long wait times for care.
- High rates of depression, suicide, and substance use disorders.
- Stigma and lack of awareness preventing individuals from seeking treatment.

4. Access to Healthcare

- Limited availability of primary care and behavioral health providers.
- Transportation barriers affecting residents' ability to seek medical care.
- High rates of uninsured and underinsured individuals, restricting access to preventive care.

5. Access to Healthy Foods

- Food deserts make it difficult for residents to obtain fresh, nutritious food.
- High cost of healthy food options, leading to reliance on processed foods.
- Need for more community-based nutrition and wellness initiatives.

6. Affordable Housing

- Increasing demand for safe and affordable housing options.
- A high percentage of cost-burdened households spend more than 30% of their income on housing.
- Impact of housing insecurity on physical and mental health.

7. Accidents & Injury

- High rates of motor vehicle accidents and workplace injuries.
- Need for stronger safety measures and injury prevention programs.
- Increased demand for public education on accident prevention and first aid.

Community Description & Demographics



Canadian County

Description of the Community Served

Geography

Canadian County is located in **central Oklahoma**. The county spans approximately 905 square miles, incorporating urban and rural areas. **El Reno** is the county seat, and **Yukon** is the largest city. Canadian County consists of multiple ZIP codes, including but not limited to 73036 (El Reno), 73099 (Yukon), 73064 (Mustang), 73078 (Piedmont), and parts of 73127 and 73128, which encompass sections of west Oklahoma City. The county's combination of small towns, expanding suburban developments, and rural communities creates a range of health care needs that require a variety of medical and public health services.

Economy & Employment

The economy of Canadian County, OK, employs 79.1K people. The largest industries in Canadian County, OK are Retail Trade (10,221 people), Health Care & Social Assistance (9,554 people), and Educational Services (7,373 people), and the highest paying industries are Utilities (\$97,520), Management of Companies & Enterprises (\$89,250), and Mining, Quarrying, & Oil & Gas Extraction (\$74,250). These industries contribute significantly to the county's economic stability and workforce development.

Unique Community Characteristics

Canadian County is a growing community with substantial educational and workforce development resources. **Redlands Community College and Canadian Valley Technology Center** provide training in health care and technical fields. Tourism plays a role in the local economy, with **Historic Route 66, Fort Reno, and Express Ranches** attracting visitors and contributing to community pride.

Health Services Available in the Community

Health care services in Canadian County include **INTEGRIS Health Canadian Valley Hospital (Yukon), Mercy Hospital (OKC), and SSM Health St. Anthony Healthplex (Yukon)**. The Canadian County Health Department, Variety Care (FQHC), and the El

Reno Indian Health Clinic provide additional services. **Red Rock Behavioral Health Services** offers mental health and substance use treatment, though gaps remain in access to care. Expanding local provider availability and telehealth services may improve health care access for residents.

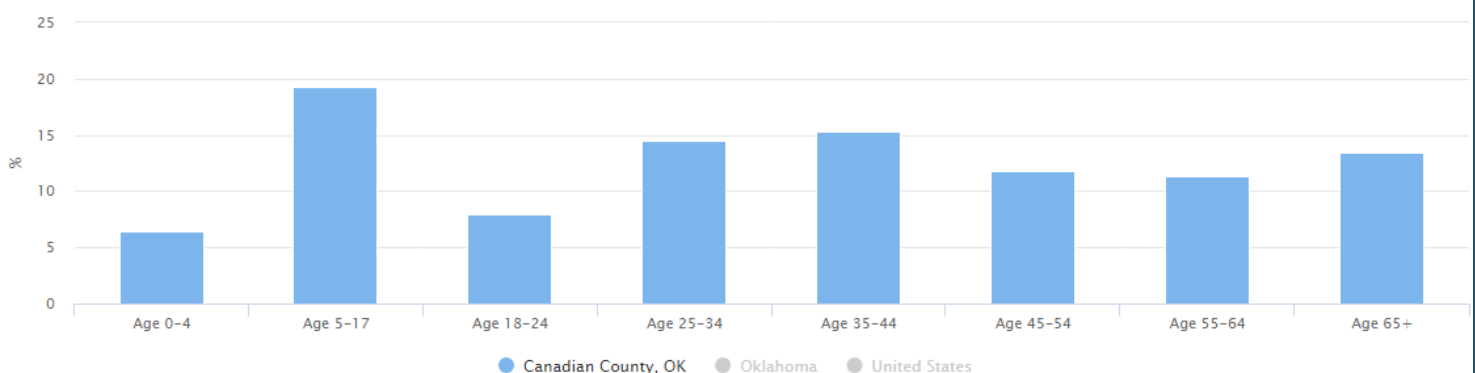

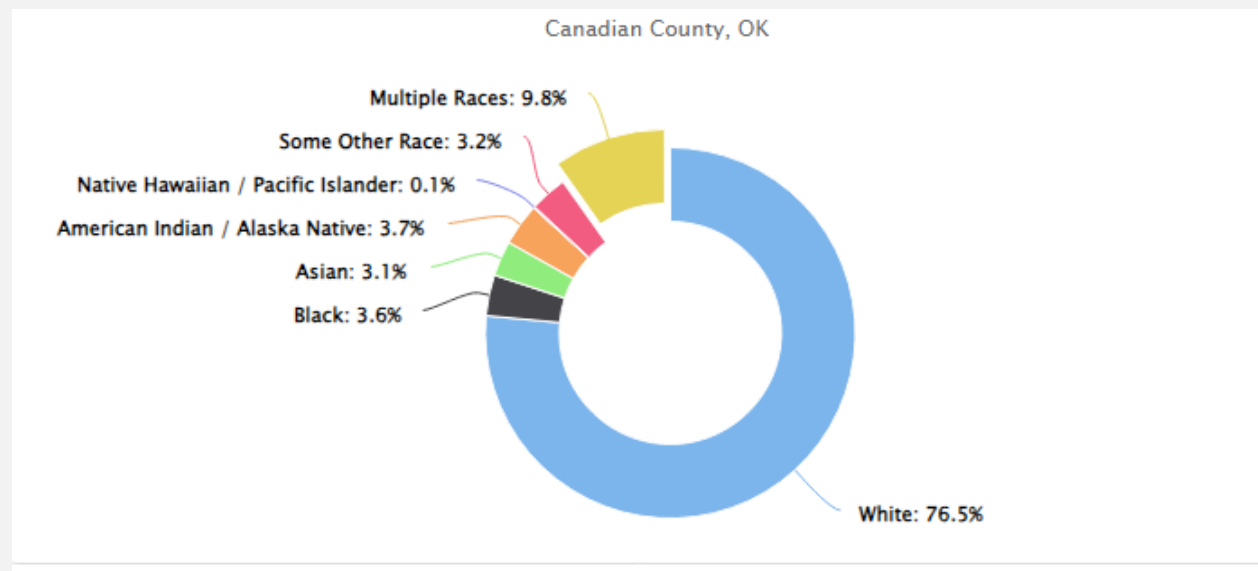

Total Population by Age Groups, Percent

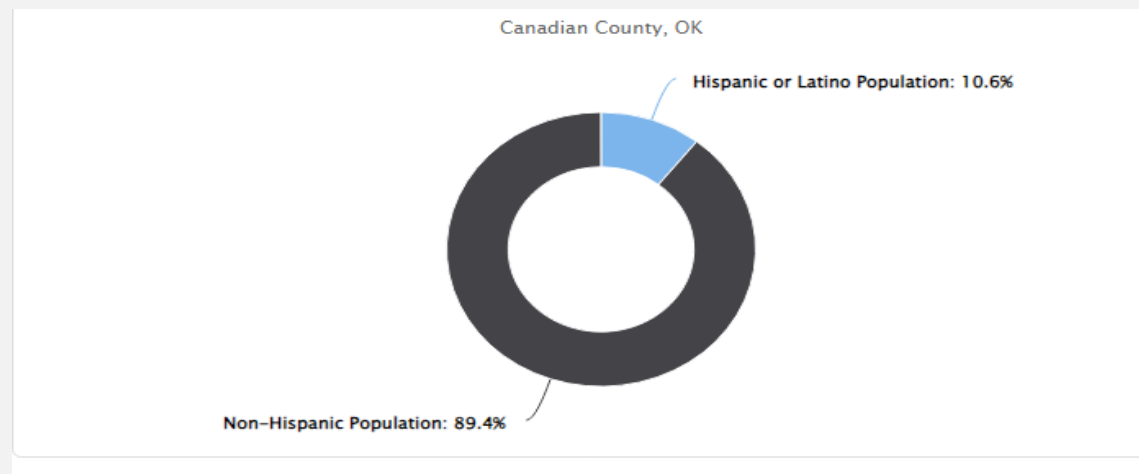


Total Population by Race Alone

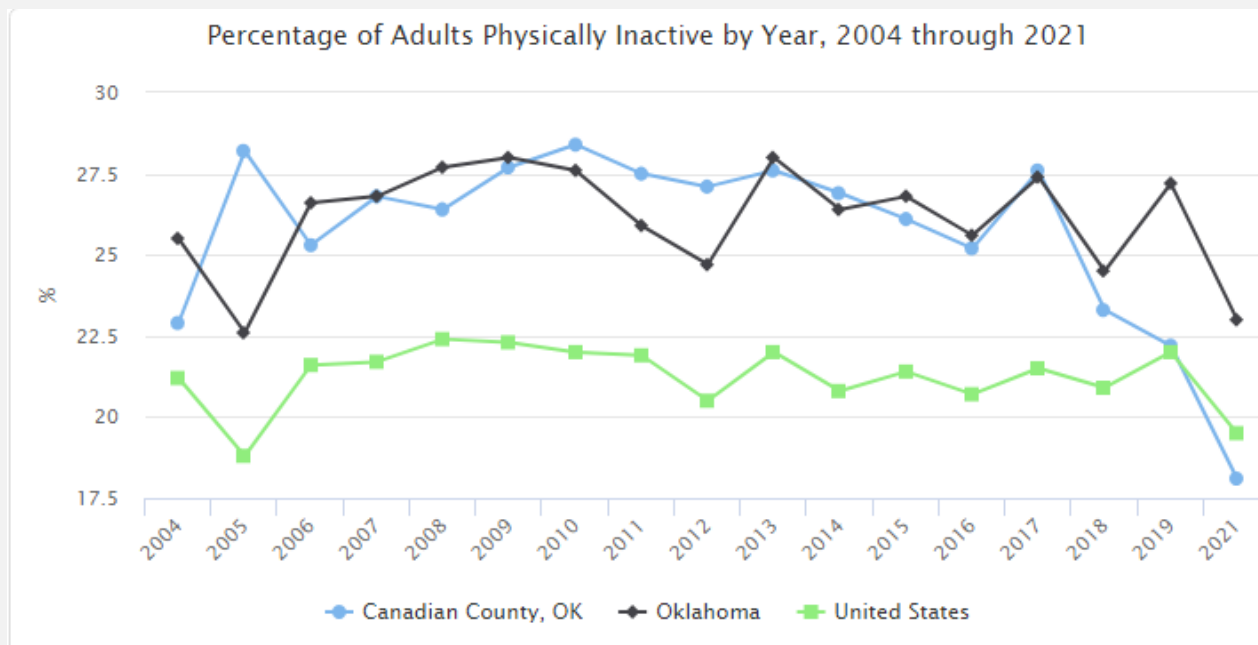

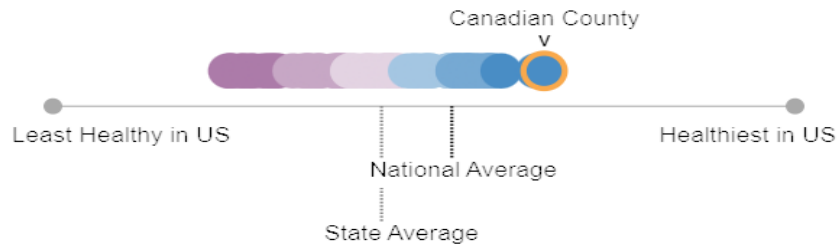
Many things influence how well and how long we live. Health Factors represent those things we can improve to live longer and healthier lives. They are indicators of the future health of our communities.

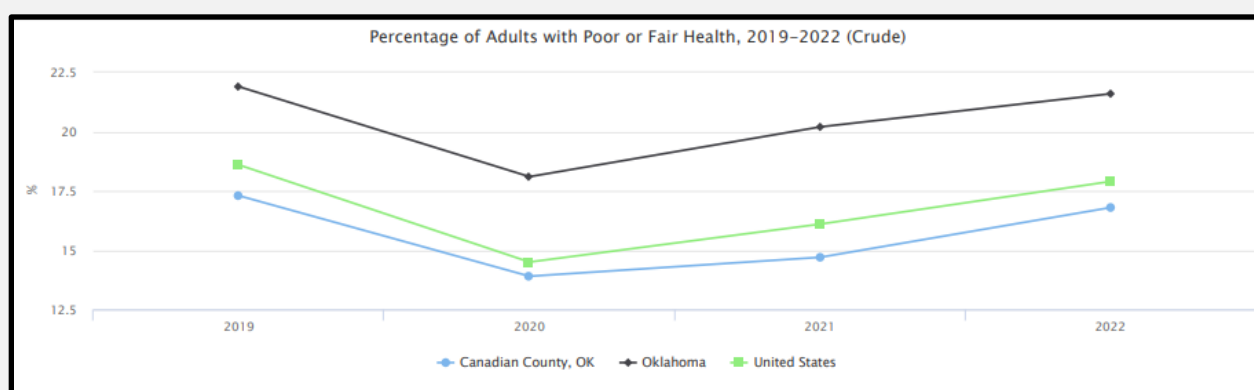

Community Health Needs Assessment Process

The Canadian County Coalition collaborated with local community partners to conduct the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). This process aimed to gather comprehensive data on community health needs, focusing on underserved and minority populations.

Committee members engaged various stakeholders to **ensure diverse community representation**. They thoroughly reviewed county demographics to identify population groups that needed to be included, **ensuring no group was overlooked**. Special efforts were made to reach at-risk populations, particularly those in low socioeconomic zip codes.

After forming a team and identifying the target audience, an online survey was created to assess community health priorities. The survey was available electronically and in paper form in English and Spanish. Flyers with QR codes and links were distributed via email and social media to publicize the survey to county residents.

The coalition strategically distributed surveys to various community contacts, including business owners and organizations serving underserved populations, to obtain the most

accurate results. The coalition held weekly meetings to review survey demographics, identify gaps in participation, and explore outreach improvements. The coalition polled the public to identify the underserved in their neighborhoods and asked them to assist in getting the survey out to them. They identified veterans, the unhoused, low-income, disabled, single parents, those with mental health issues, rural populations, students, the elderly, the under-educated, and youth.

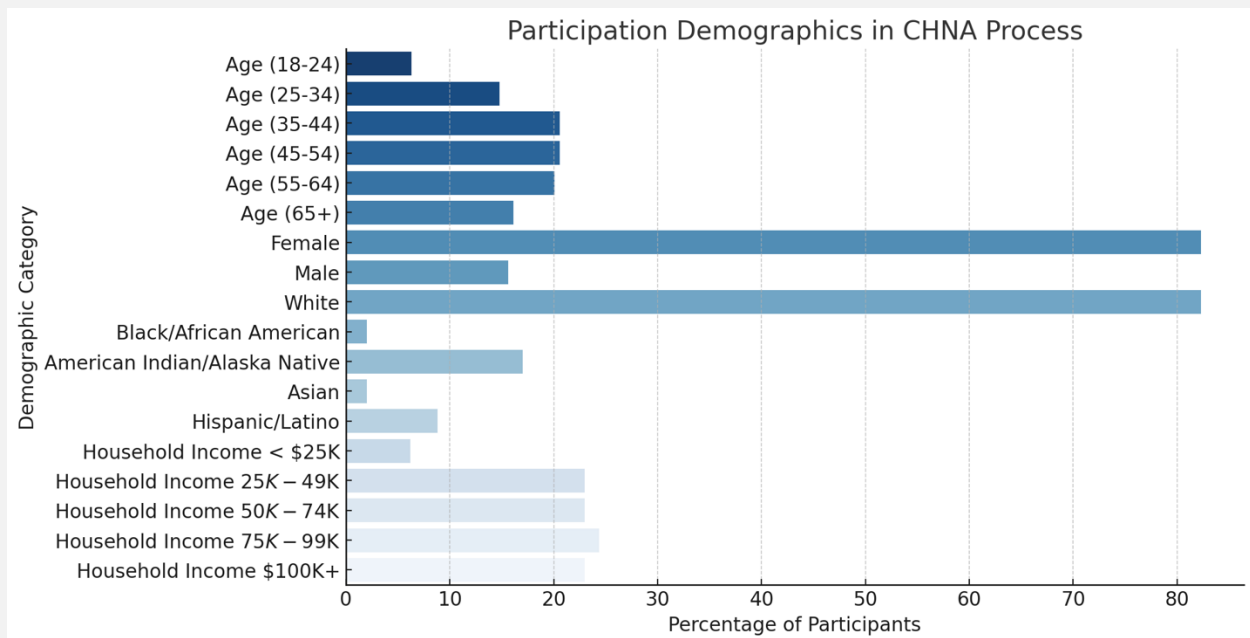
A community listening session was held to discuss state and local health data. Participants shared their concerns, learned about available resources, and compared county data to state trends. The team obtained feedback from **230 online surveys**.

Methods of collecting and analyzing data and information included online surveys, published data, and hospital-specific data. Community partners that assisted in data collection for community chats included local nonprofit organizations.

To illustrate these outreach efforts, the following flowchart outlines the CHNA process.

Findings Analysis	Analyze findings and identify key health issues.
Report Writing	Write and structure the CHNA report.
Final CHNA Report	Finalize and distribute the CHNA report.

Primary Data: The Canadian County Coalition gathered community input from Canadian County residents of all backgrounds, socioeconomic statuses, and demographics. Participants included members of underserved, low-income, and minority populations. Additionally, the hospitals provided internal data for analysis and consideration in the CHNA process. Canadian County Coalition representatives allowed individuals to participate in quantitative and qualitative surveys. (For detailed survey questions and responses, see Appendix A.)

Published Secondary Data: In addition to the input from community chats and online surveys, the compilation of public health data and state and national data gave a broader view of the overall health status of the county. By looking at past and present data and identifying trends, strategic development for the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) will be more efficient and, ultimately, more effective. Integrating primary and secondary data sources ensures that the CHNA findings reflect lived community experiences and objective health indicators, leading to more effective public health interventions.

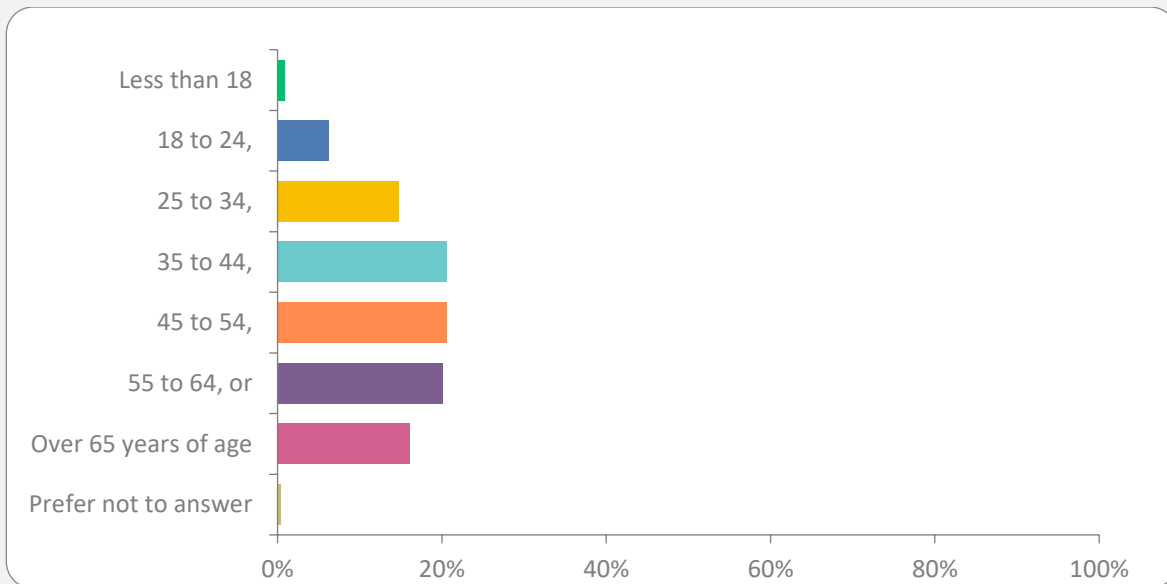
Online Survey Demographics

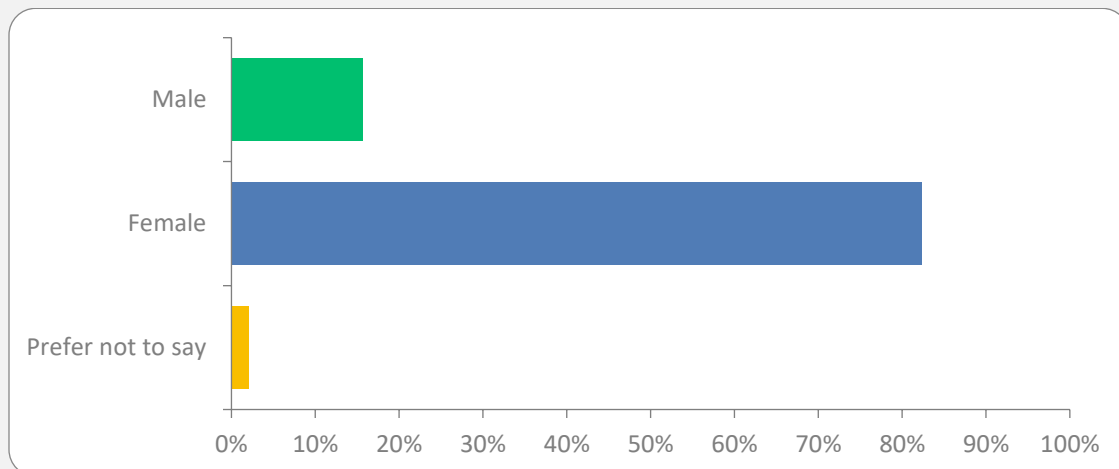
Online Quantitative Surveys

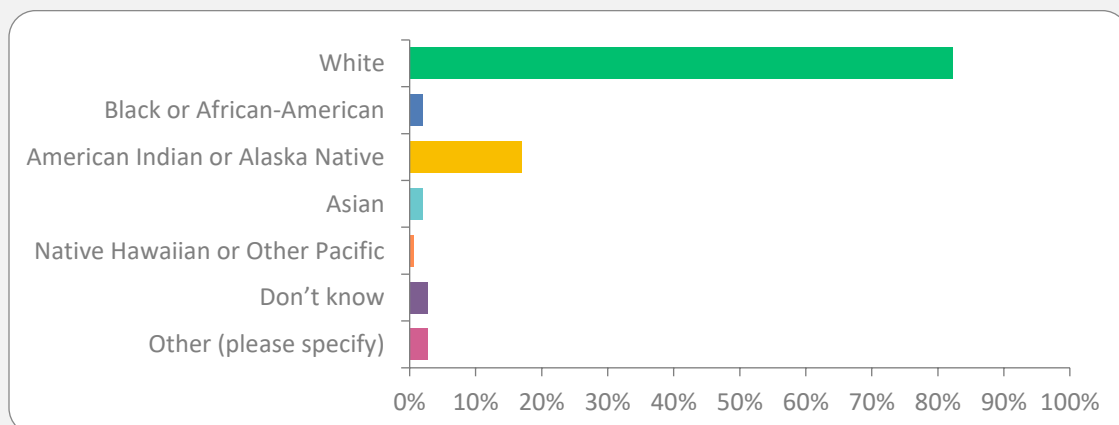
Age



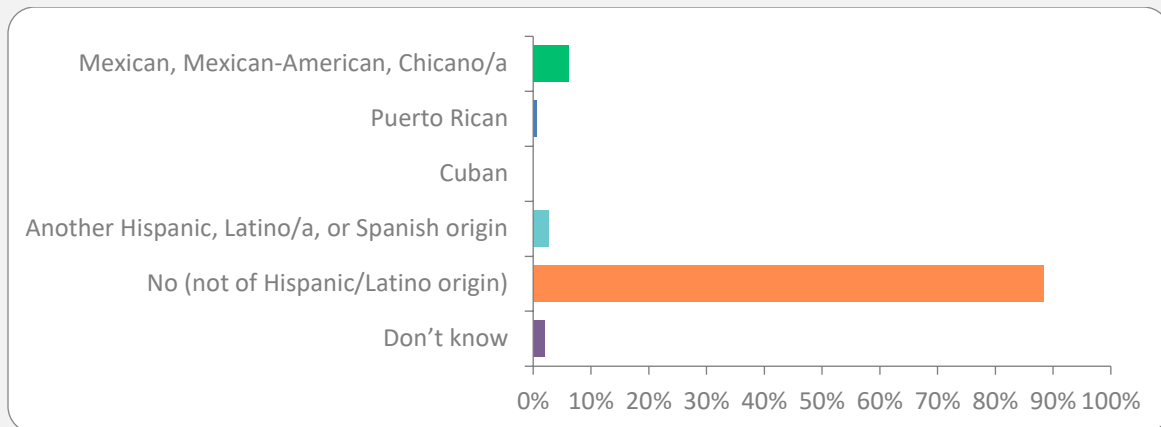
Gender at birth

CHNA Results

Overall, the results of the listening session and surveys in Canadian County identified several critical health concerns. The most essential health needs include improving access to mental and physical health services. The community also emphasized the need for improved access to healthy foods, particularly lowering the cost of fruits and vegetables. Other key issues identified were concerns around transportation, better pay, and more job opportunities. Participants expressed that mental health challenges were exacerbated by a lack of providers, substance abuse, and stigma, as well as a lack of knowledge about available resources. In response, the community suggested creating a comprehensive list of local resources for easier distribution.

Priority Health Issues

Both primary and secondary data were analyzed and combined to determine the most critical health needs within Canadian County. These needs cover various topic areas and are often interconnected:

- Obesity
- Smoking
- Mental Health
- Access to Healthcare
- Access to Healthy Foods
- Affordable Housing
- Accidents/Injury



Community Priority Issues

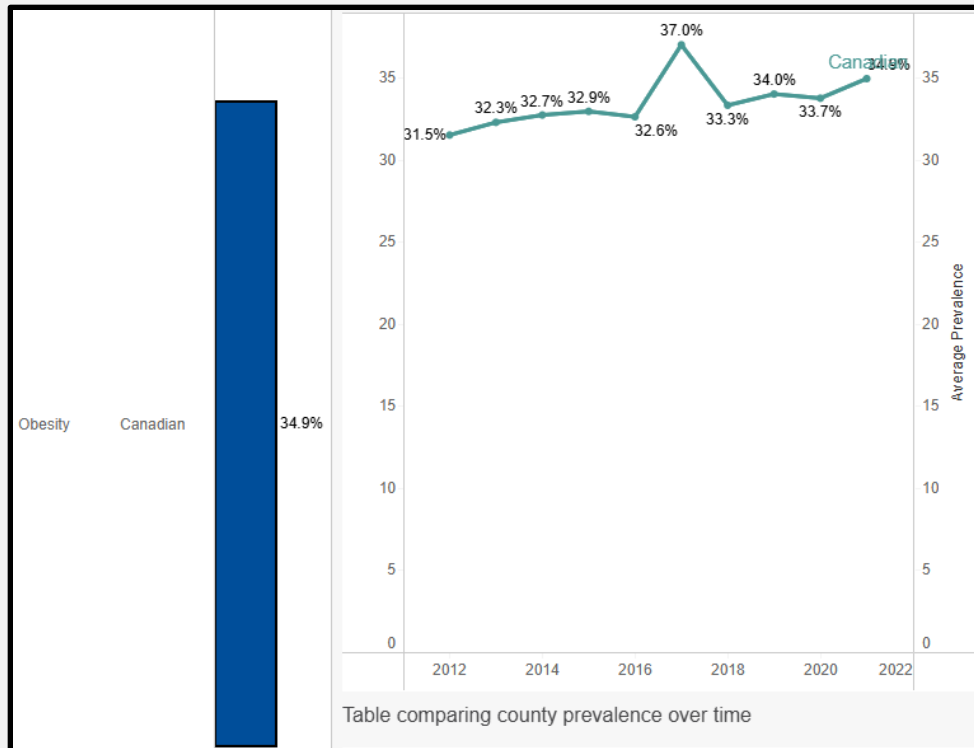
After analyzing the data, seven priority elements appeared most prevalent. Based on one or more assessments, each was identified as a significant public health issue. The following summarizes each aspect and the data that supported its selection.

Obesity

Obesity results from various causes and contributing factors, including behavior and genetics. Behaviors include dietary patterns, physical activity, inactivity, medication use, and other exposures. Additional factors include food and physical environment, education and skills, and food marketing and promotion. Obesity is a serious concern because it is associated with poorer mental health outcomes, reduced quality of life, and the leading causes of death in the United States, including diabetes, heart disease, stroke, and some types of cancer.

In the listening session, public health professionals identified obesity as an element of Access to Healthy Food, which they identified as an essential health problem in the community.

Adult Obesity is defined as a Body Mass Index (BMI) greater than or equal to 30 (Overweight is 25.0 to 29.9, Normal is 18.5 to 24.9). The 2024 Wellness County profile reported that Canadian County's Adult Obesity rate was **34.9%**. Other related measures were < 1 Fruit a Day (44.6%, lower is better), Physical Activity (81.2%, higher is better), and Diabetes (11.8%).



County Health Rankings & Roadmaps reported an Adult Obesity rate at 36% in Canadian County and indicated the measure was an “Area to Explore.”

The Community Commons Health Indicators Report indicated an Adult Obesity rate of 34.3%, finishing in the red on its dashboard indicator.

Obesity

This indicator reports the number and percentage of adults aged 20 and older self-report having a Body Mass Index (BMI) greater than 30.0 (obese). Respondents were considered obese if their Body Mass Index (BMI) was 30 or greater. Body mass index (weight [kg]/height [m]²) was derived from self-report of height and weight. Excess weight may indicate an unhealthy lifestyle and puts individuals at risk for further health issues.

Within the report area, there are a total of 39,985 adults age 20 and older who self-reported having a BMI greater than 30.0. This represents a 34.3% of the survey population.

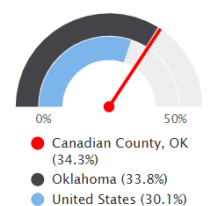

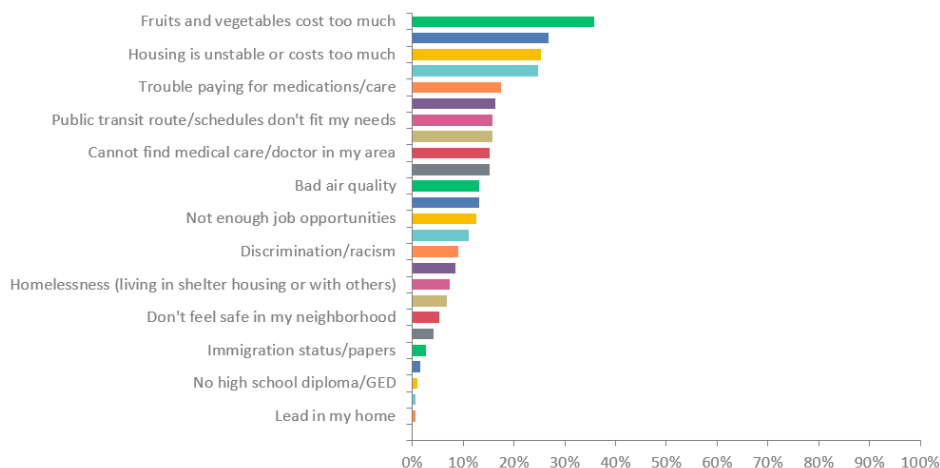
Percentage of Adults Obese (BMI > 30.0), 2021

Smoking

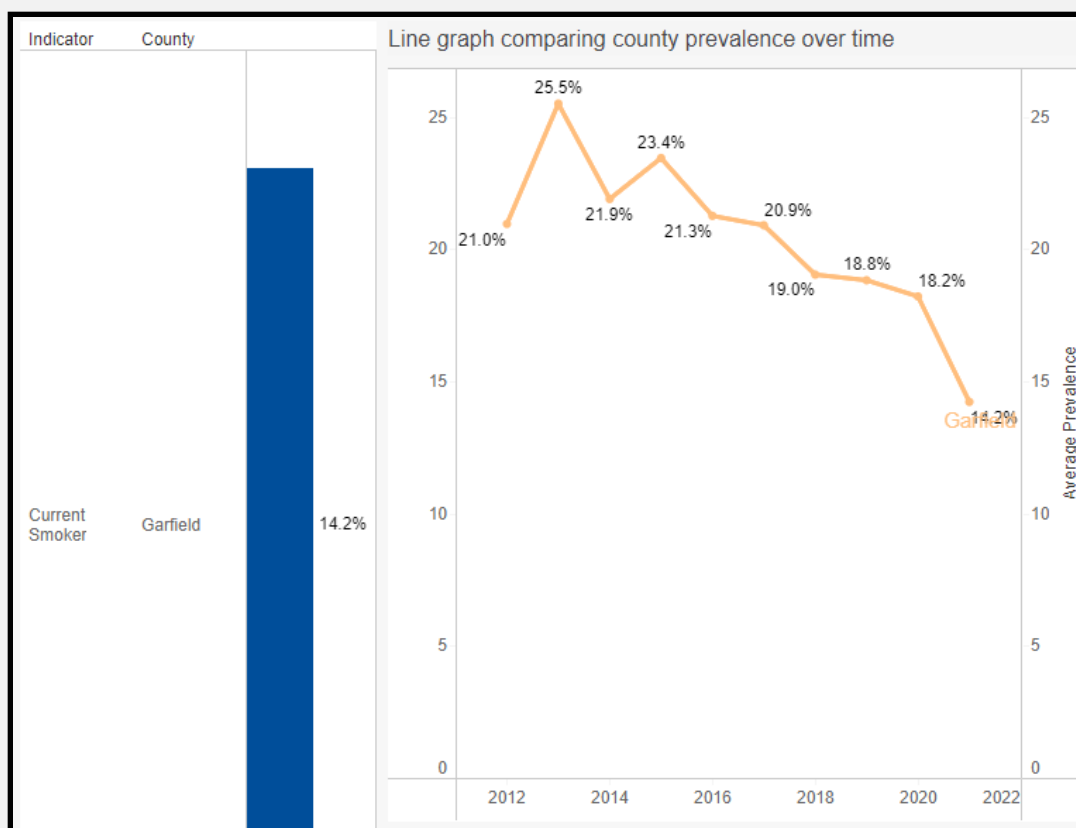
Cigarette smoking is the leading **preventable** cause of disease, death, and disability in the United States. Cigarette smoking and secondhand smoke exposure cause more than 480,000 deaths each year in the United States. This is nearly one in five deaths.

Cigarette smoking causes many diseases and reduces the health of people who smoke. Smoking also increases health care utilization, health care costs, and absenteeism from work.

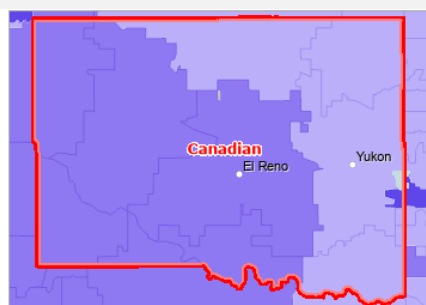

Current Smokers, Adult, Percent of Adults Age 18+ by ZCTA, CDC BRFSS PLACES Project 2022

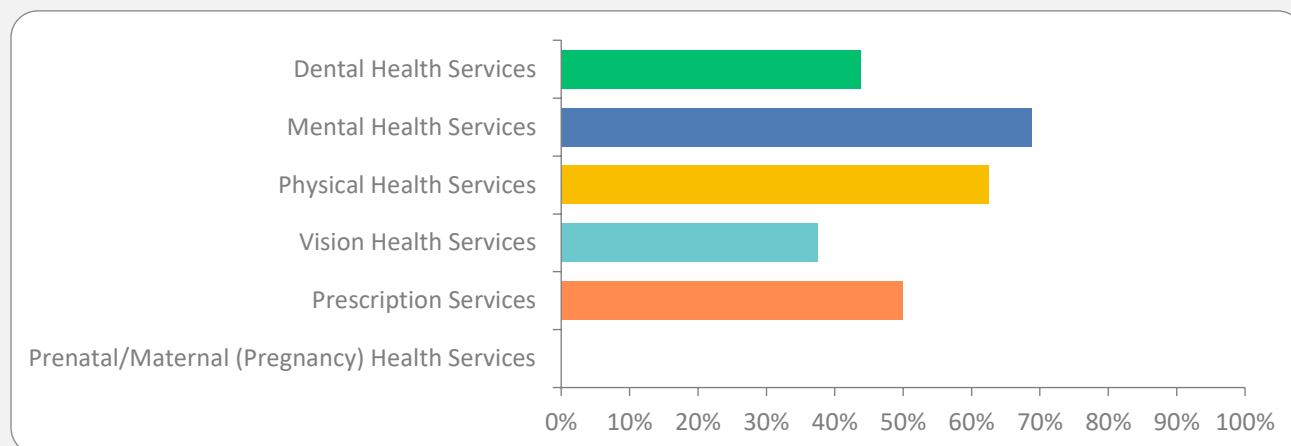

Mental Health

When asked what could improve the community’s health, the issue of access to mental health services ranked as the highest priority. Participants expressed concerns about the lack of mental health resources and access to care, including the need for more providers and treatment for mental health and substance use disorders. Mental health stigma was also identified as a barrier to seeking help. These challenges were amplified by the connection between mental health issues and substance use, which participants noted is becoming an increasing concern in the community.

When the input is combined with the county data, it is clear to see that residents may not be getting the care they need, whether it is an access issue, lack of education, compliance, or many other potential reasons. **The Survey identified Mental Health Services as the most difficult type of health service to get for household members.**

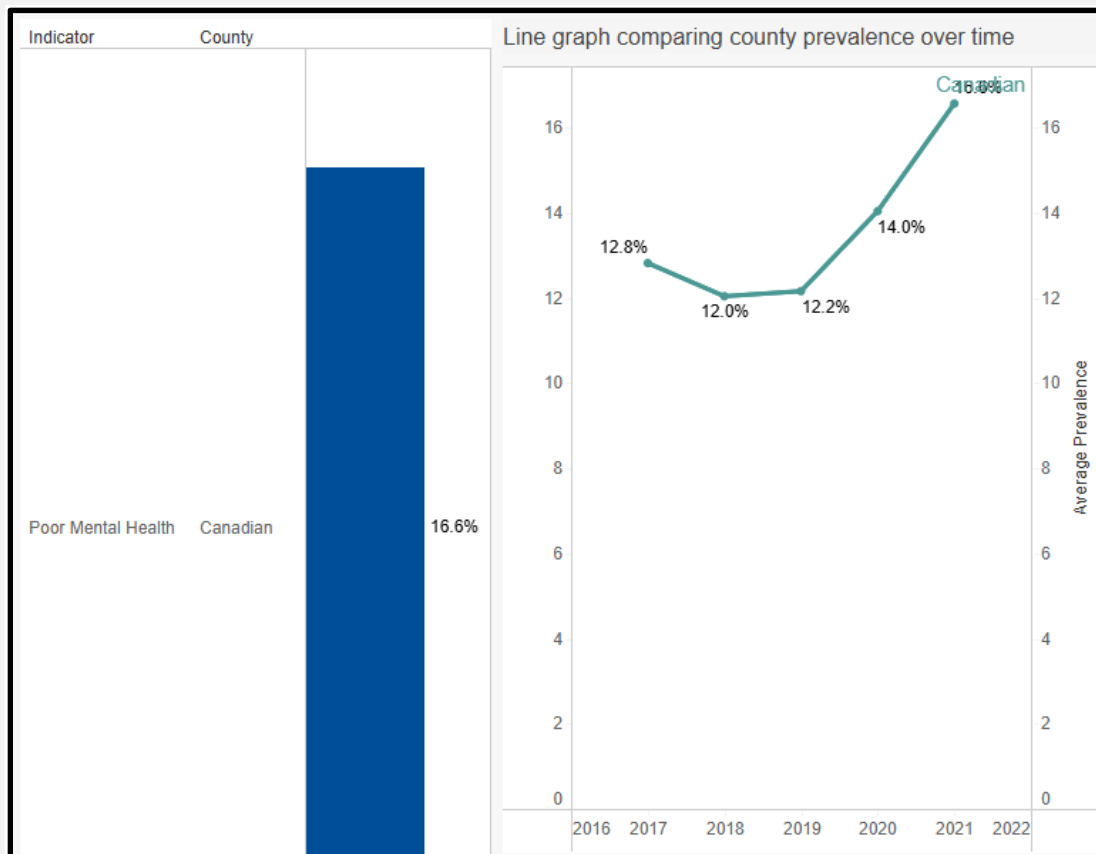

This indicator reports the 2018-2022 five-year average rate of death due to intentional self-harm (suicide) per 100,000 population. Figures are reported as crude rates. Rates are resummarized for report areas from county level data, only where data is available. This indicator is relevant because suicide is an indicator of poor mental health. Within the report area, there are a total of 124 deaths due to suicide. This represents a crude death rate of **16.0 per every 100,000 total population.**

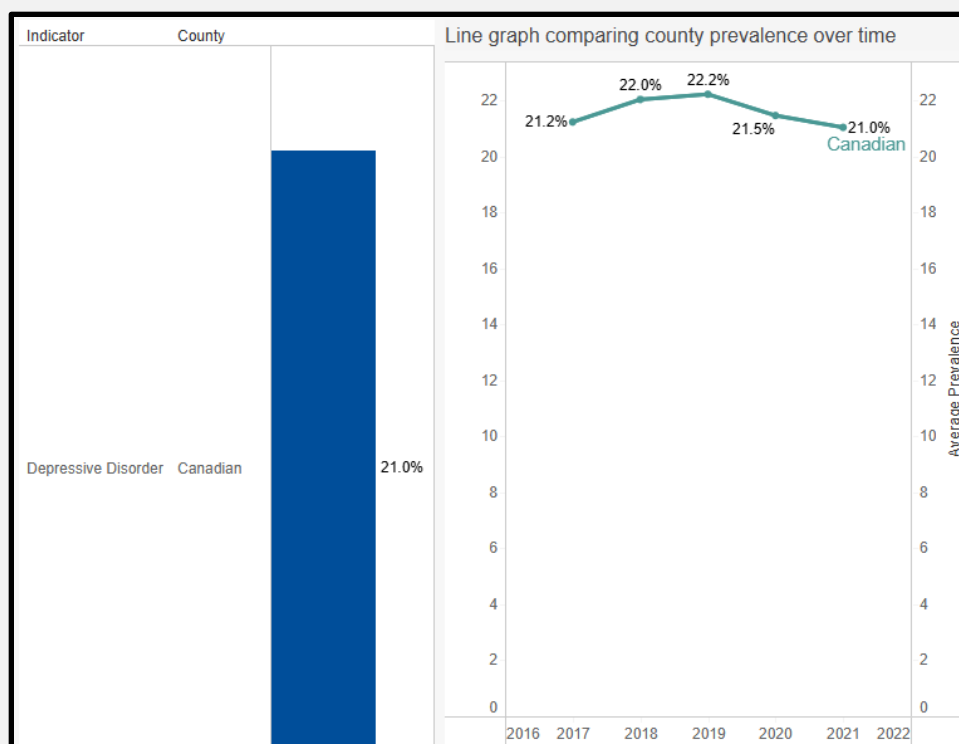

Before the Pandemic, about one in five adults had a mental illness. The pandemic has affected the state of mental health in our country and made mental illness even more common. It is rare that a family is not touched by a mental health condition, one that can interfere with your or a loved one's ability to work, sleep, eat, and enjoy life.

Depressive Disorder, as reported by the Wellness County Profile, is the percentage of respondents ever told they have a depressive disorder (e.g., depression, major depression, dysthymia). Canadian County's rate was 21.0%.

In the listening session, public health professionals identified mental health as one of the most important health problem in the community. Individual elements identified in the discussion included general mental health, access to mental health services, the relationship between mental health and drug abuse, lack of mental health resources, and the need for mental health - substance use disorder treatment.

An identified barrier or challenge to improving community health was “Lack of Supportive Community Environments.” One of the elements to this was “poor mental health bandwidth to make improvements.”

Prevention Efforts:

- **Expanding telehealth services** for mental health consultations.
- **School-based mental health initiatives** to provide early intervention.
- **Peer support programs** in the community to promote open discussions and reduce stigma.
- **Mental health crisis training** for law enforcement and first responders.

Access to Healthcare

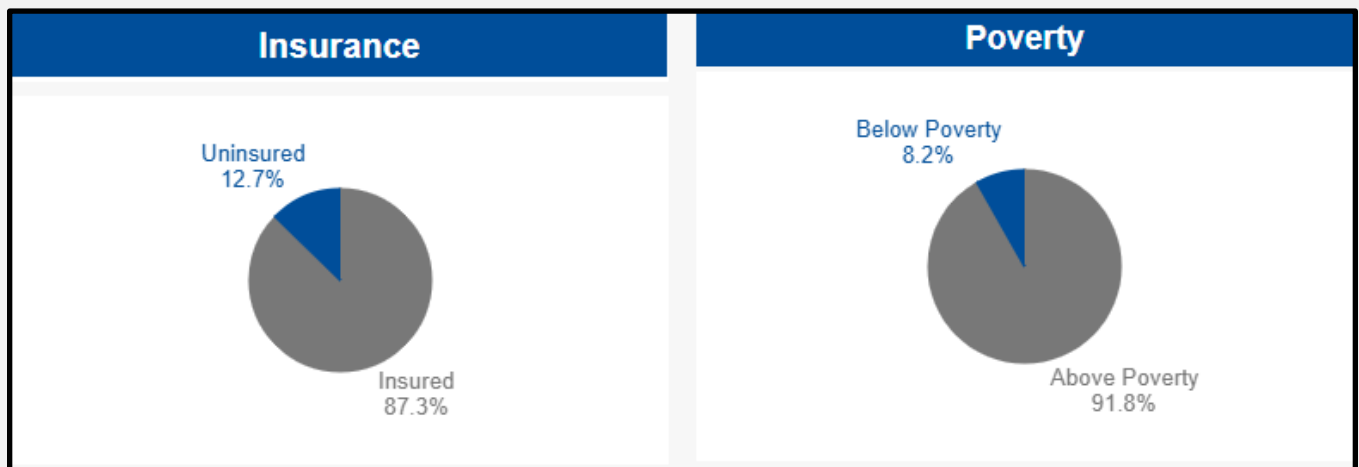
In the Canadian County Coalition Community Health Assessment, residents identified Access to Healthcare as one of their important health problems.

Access to comprehensive, quality health care services promote and maintains good health, prevents and manages diseases, reduces unnecessary disability and premature death, and encourages health equity. Three components of access are insurance coverage, availability of health services, and timeliness of care. The uninsured and underinsured populations experience delays in receiving timely care and lack the ability to receive preventative treatments. They often seek care in local emergency rooms, which results in preventable hospital admissions.

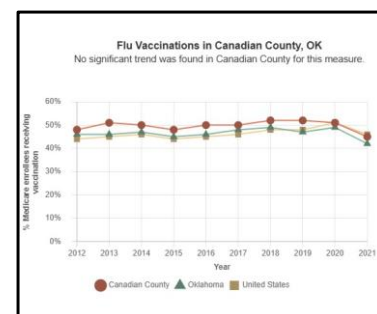
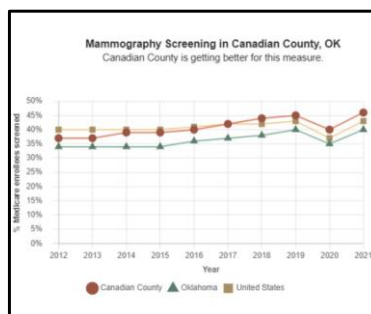
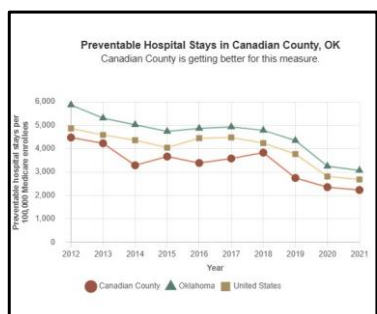
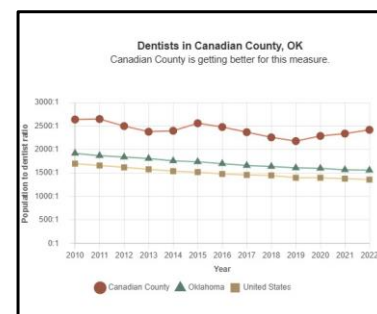
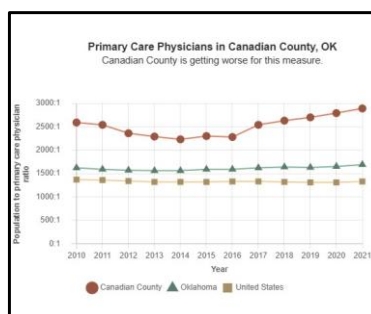
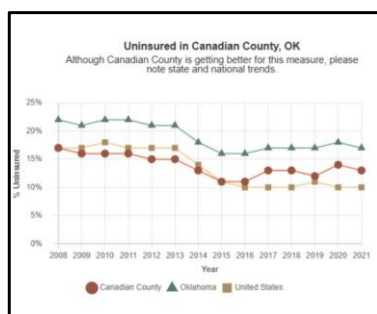
A lack of access to care presents barriers to good health. Supply of facilities and physicians, the rate of uninsurance, financial hardship, transportation barriers, cultural competency, and coverage limitations affect access.

Rates of morbidity, mortality, and emergency hospitalizations can be reduced if community residents access services such as health screenings, routine tests, and vaccinations. Prevention indicators can call attention to a lack of access or knowledge regarding one or more health issues and can inform program interventions.

The Wellness County Profile for Canadian County indicated an **Uninsured rate of 12.7%**. It also indicated a **Poverty rate of 8.2%**.

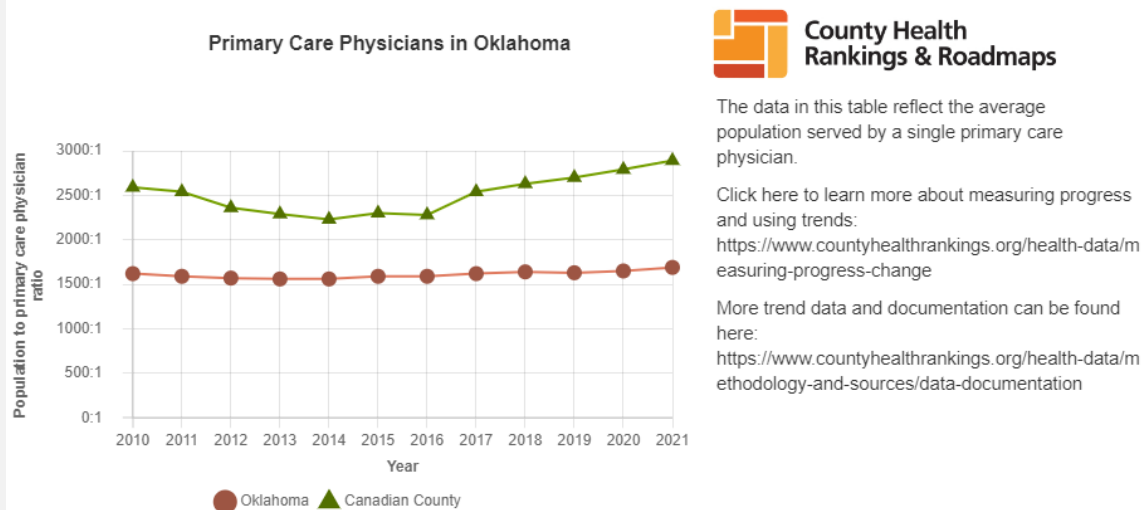

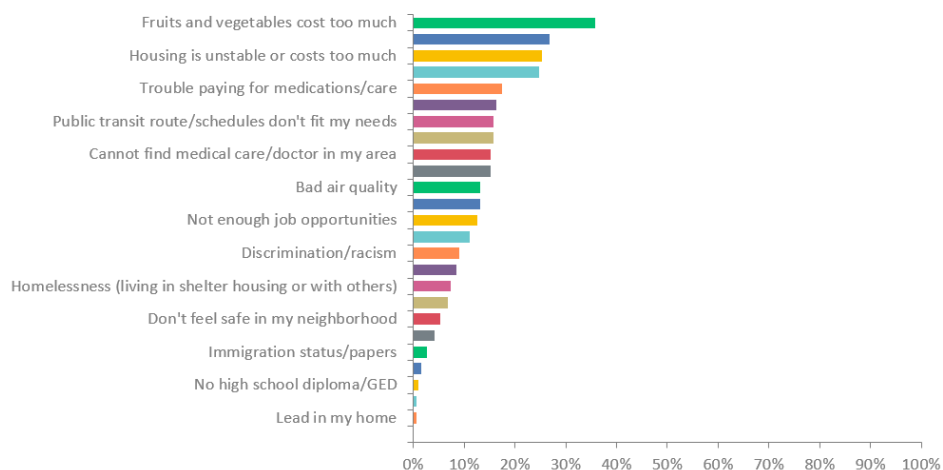

Q5: Which of the following has a negative effect on your health and well-being? Select up to 5 that are most important to you.

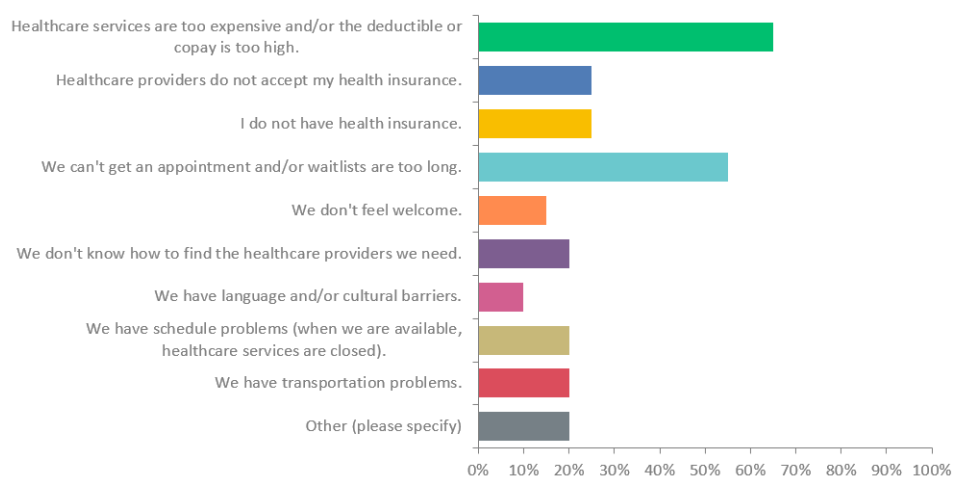

Q10: Why is getting these health services a challenge for your household members? Please select all that apply.

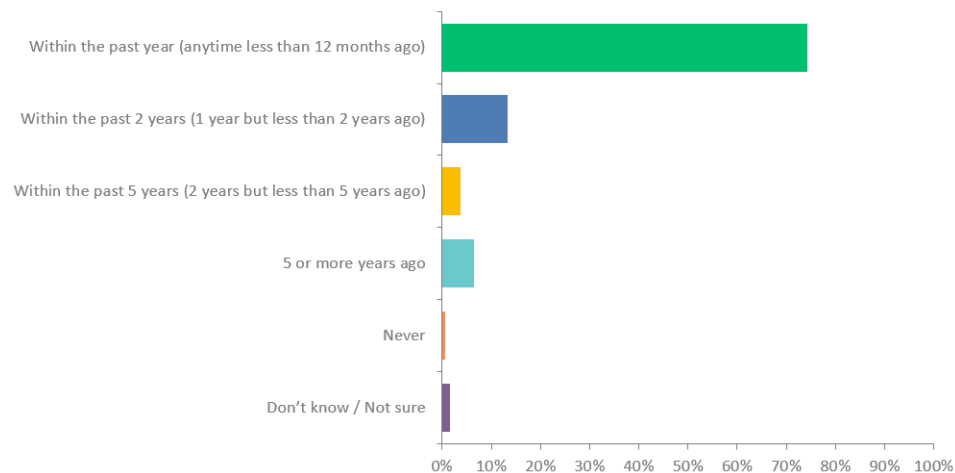

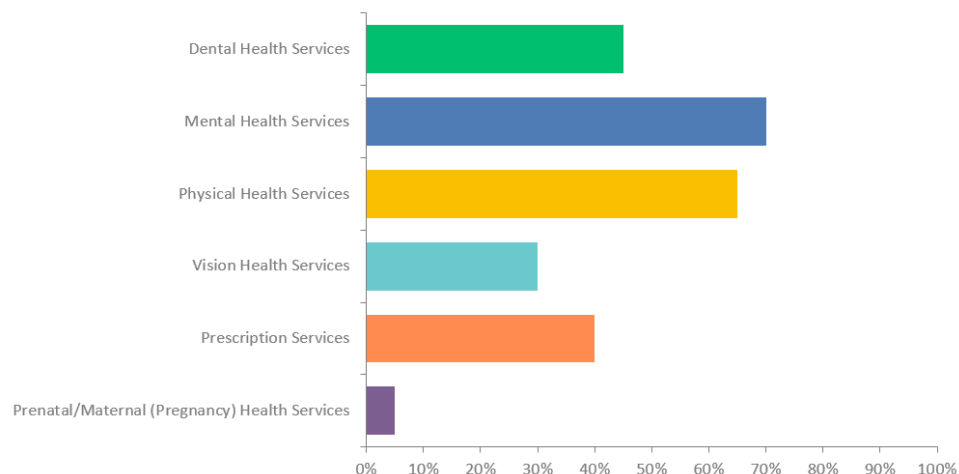

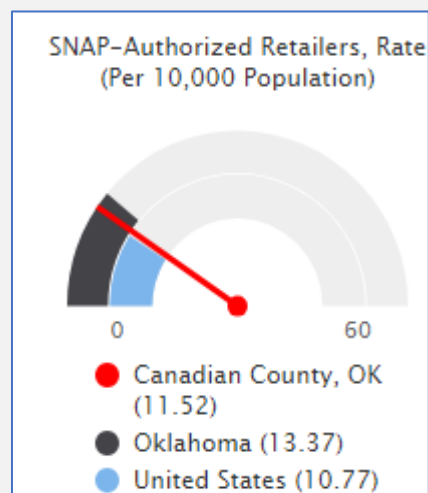
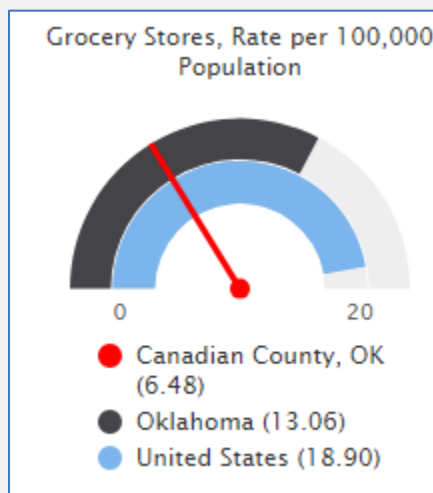
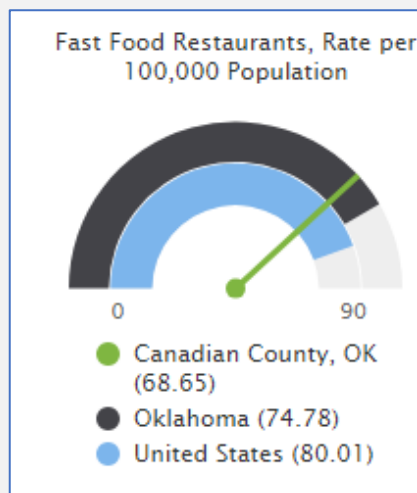
Access to Healthy Foods

Access to healthy foods can help lower the prevalence of chronic diseases.

The 2024 Canadian Wellness County Profile provided a Food Insecurity Index. Index values go from 0 (low need) to 100 (high need). Counties are ranked from 1 (low need) to 5 (high need). Selected locations within the county are ranked from 1 (low need) to 3 (high need). Canadian County was given a Food Security Index of 20.3 and a rank of 1 (lowest need). The ZIP Code with the highest Food Security Index were 73036 (Index of 72.2, rank of 3, the highest need).

During the listening session, affordable prices, fruit and vegetable consumption, healthy choices for food and drink, proper nutrition, healthy food, and obesity, were all factors that came up when discussing access to healthy foods. Looking at the county data, it is evident a significant number of families are living below the Federal Poverty Level. Families struggling to make ends meet often choose foods that are inexpensive which are the highest processed, unhealthy items. However, people of all economic levels often eat out more due to the convenience fast food and other processed foods offer.

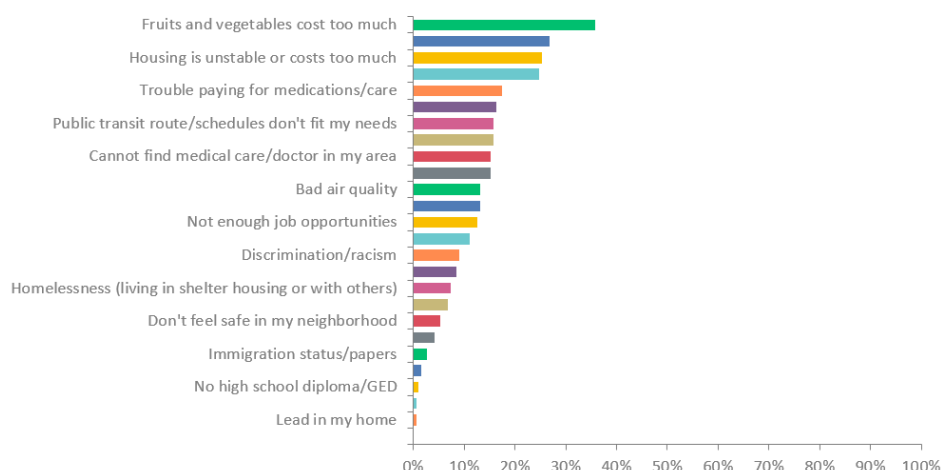

In the listening session, public health professionals identified access to healthy food as one of the most important health problem in the community. Individual elements identified in the discussion included affordable prices, fruits and veggies consumption, healthy choices for food and drink, proper nutrition, healthy food, and obesity.

An identified barrier or challenge to improving community health was “Lack of Supportive Policies.” One of the elements included in this barrier “lack of nutrition policies in schools.” In the Canadian County Community Health Needs Assessment Survey, 35.79% chose “fruits and vegetables cost too much,” finishing first among the choices. “Not enough healthy/nutritious food” finished second with 26.84%.

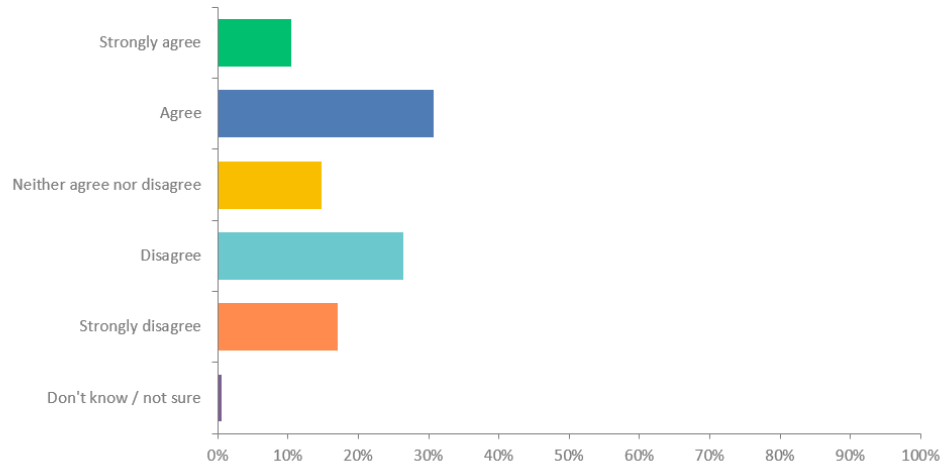

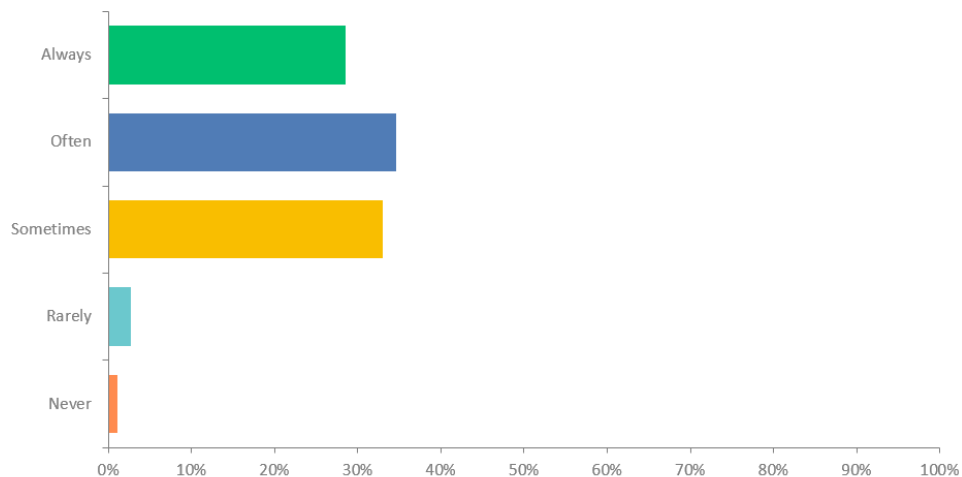

Q16: I can get healthy food for my family.

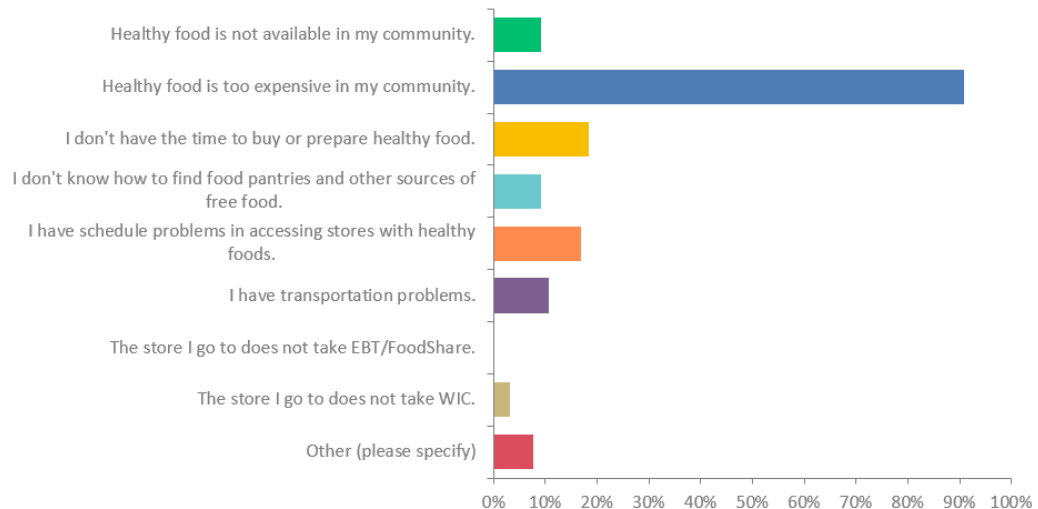

Affordable Housing

Housing is a social determinant of health. For low-income, vulnerable households, there are challenges in creating a sense of home in a new tenancy which may have substantial effects on health and wellbeing.

According to the 2024 County Health Rankings & Roadmaps, 9% of households experienced at least one of the following housing problems: overcrowding, high housing costs, lack of kitchen facilities or lack of plumbing facilities. This compared favorably to the state rate of 13% and the national rate of 17%. Furthermore, in Canadian County, 76% of housing units were owner-occupied compared to the state rate of 66% and the national rate of 65%. Finally, 9% of Canadian County households spent half or more of their income on housing compared to the state at 11% and the country at 14%.

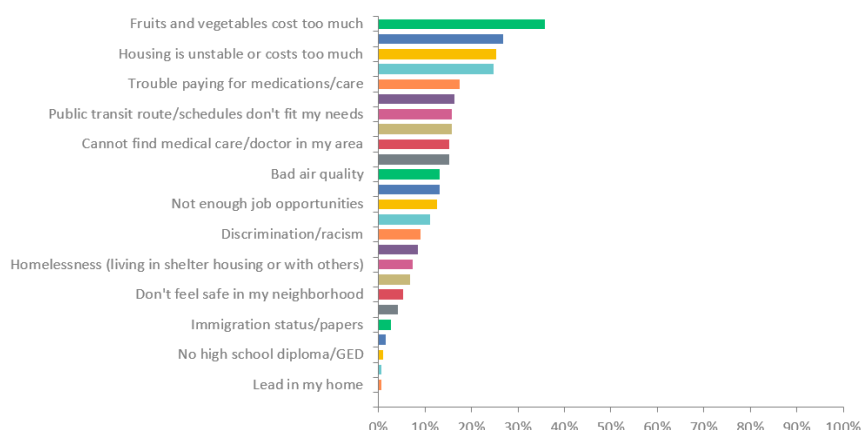
In the listening session, public health professionals identified poverty as one of the most important health issues in the community. An individual element identified in the discussion was unaffordable housing.

An identified barrier or challenge to improving community health was “Insufficient Safe Housing.” Elements included in this barrier included no shelters and community acknowledgment of unhoused population.

In the Canadian County Community Health Needs Assessment Survey, 25.26% chose “housing is unstable or costs too much,” finishing third among the choices. In addition, 7.37% chose “homelessness (living in shelter housing or with others,” 8.42% chose “bad/unsafe housing,” and 5.26% chose “don’t feel safe in my neighborhood.”

Accidents/Injury

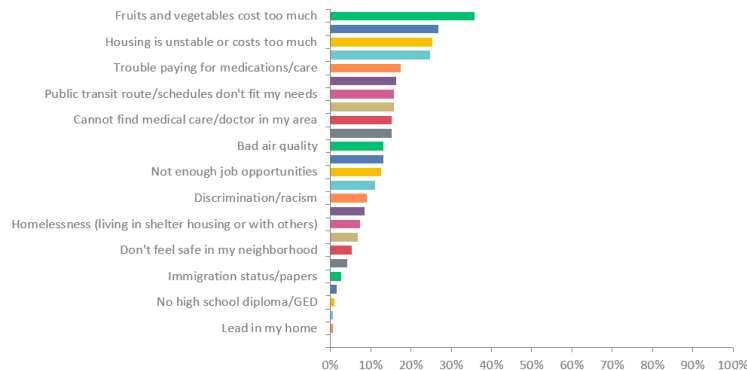
Unintentional injury is among the leading causes of death in Oklahoma. In Canadian County, according to OK2SHARE, it was the 5th leading cause of death at a rate of 57.1 per 100,000 population. Leading causes of unintentional injury death vary among ages and include such things as automobile accidents, unintentional poisonings, and falls.

Also, according to OK2SHARE, Canadian County's rate of motor vehicle accident deaths was 9.4 per 100,000 population. The county's rate of accidental poisoning deaths was 16.6 per 100,000.

In the Canadian County Community Health Needs Assessment Survey, 24.74% chose "car accidents/dangerous roads," finishing fourth among the choices.

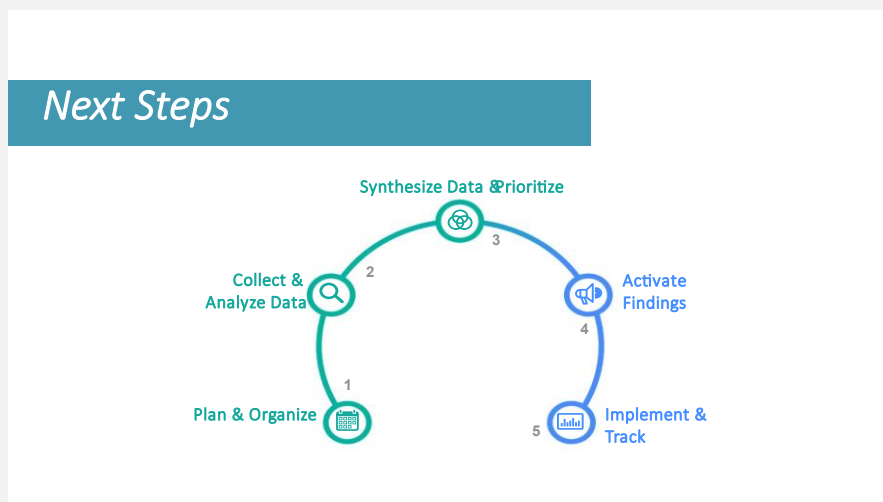
A Community Health Improvement Plan will be designed to meet the needs of the community based on the results of this assessment.

Action Plan and Next Steps

The Coalition will use this data to guide its deliberations in the strategic planning process to develop its next CHIP. Though this summary report has identified elements of particular interest, all of the data will continue to be reviewed and considered for identifying strategic issues for improving Canadian County health outcomes.

There is an important characteristic about the CHA that should be remembered; it never actually ends. Data is always being updated, new data sources created and identified, and deliberations possibly altered by new information. Once a CHIP is developed and implemented, data updates and new data sources will allow us to measure our success in accomplishing our performance objectives. In our first strategic plan cycle, we published an initial CHA summary report and then provided data updates in the Annual Reports added to the CHIP. This is a practice we intend to continue. However, some of our partners' accreditation and certification processes called for documentation of CHA updates during the strategic plan cycle. Though we functionally did this with our CHIP, we recognize the opportunity to clarify any possible confusion by also including data updates to the CHA. Therefore, Annual Updates and Supplements will be added to this summary report as they become available.

We urge community partners to view this data, use it for your unique purposes, and contact us with comments and suggestions. When the CHIP is available, take both documents together as one. The task of public health is large and varied, creating a proverbial jigsaw puzzle of many pieces. The public health system is far more than the local health department and hospital. Indeed, it is made up of every single citizen that lives in Canadian County. We all have a contribution that we can make. We have worked together over the past few years to make Canadian County one of the healthiest counties in Oklahoma. Together, let us continue this effort to make Canadian County “the” healthiest county in Oklahoma and one of the healthiest counties in the nation.

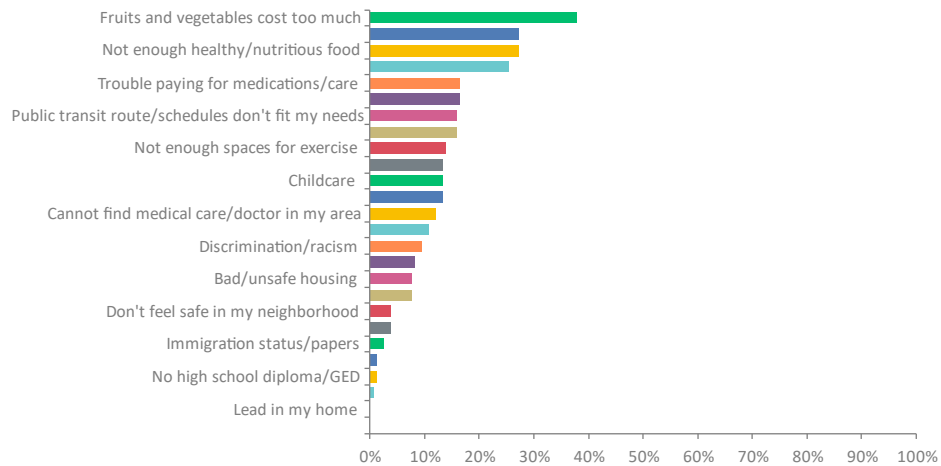

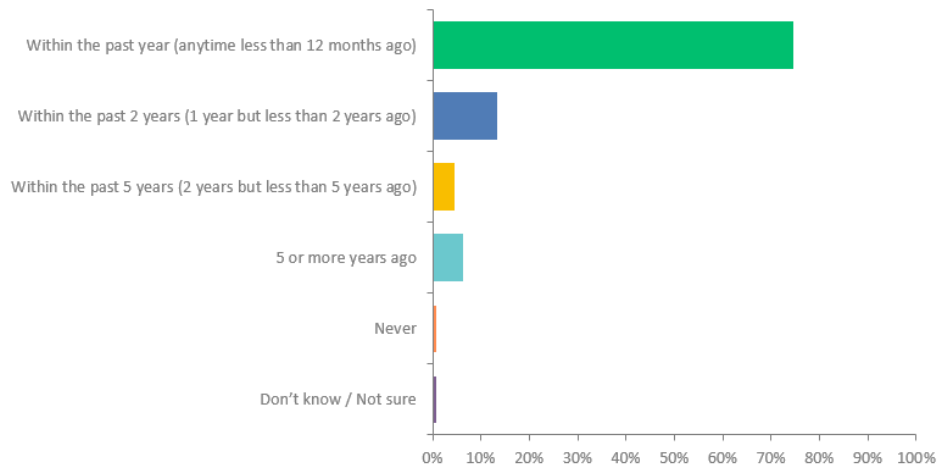

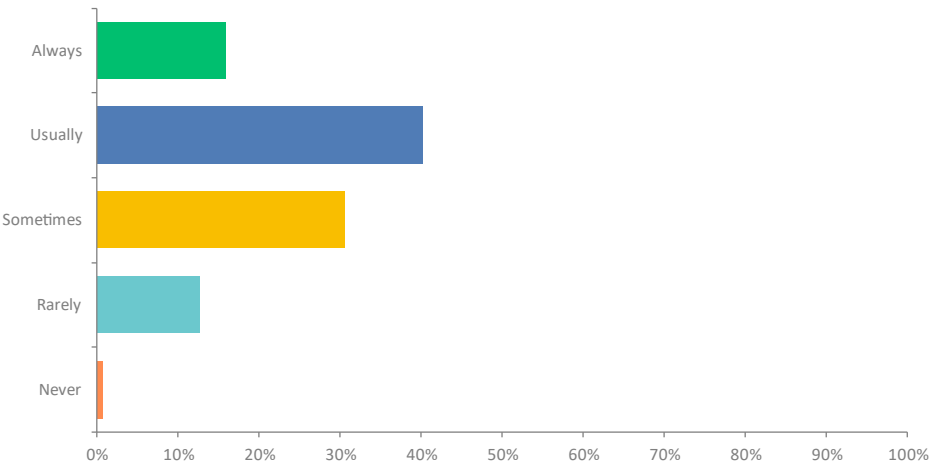

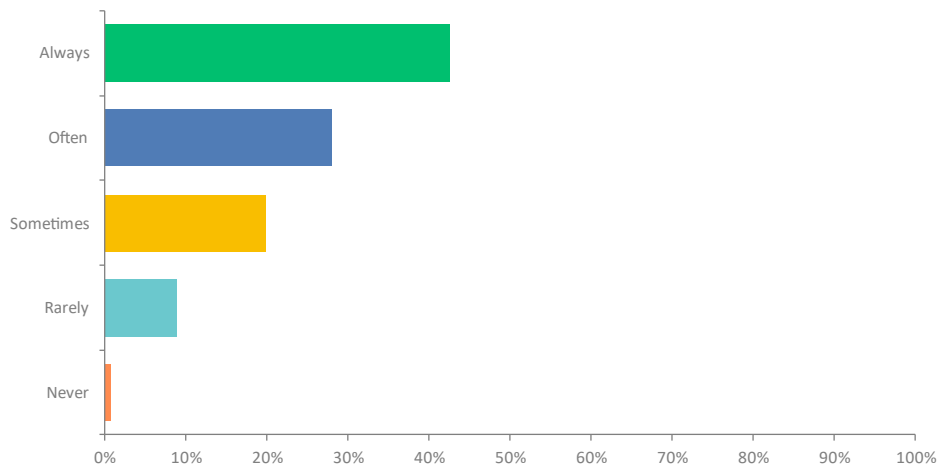

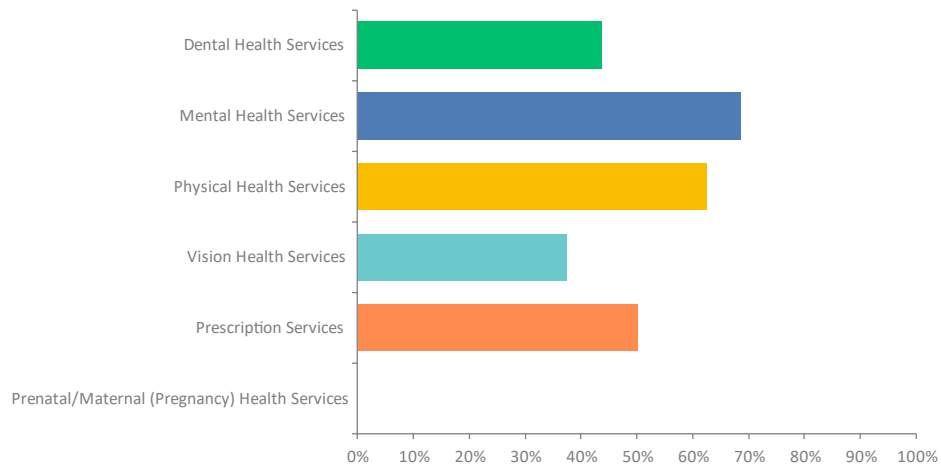

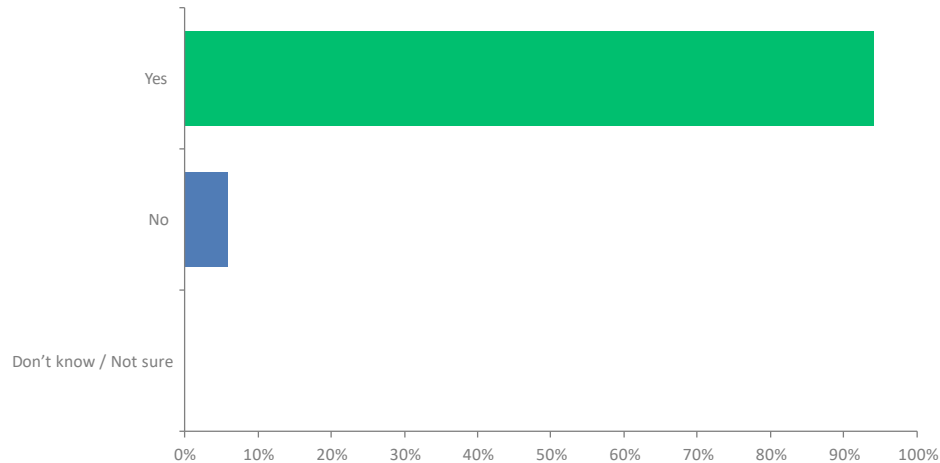

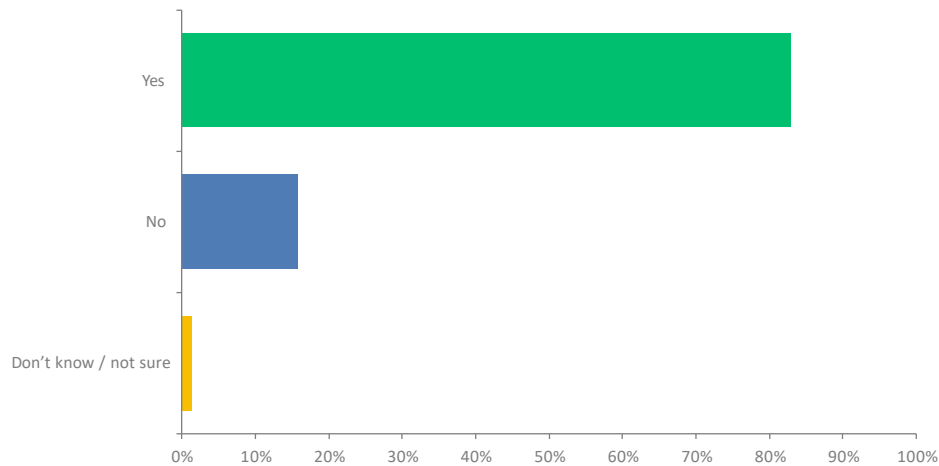

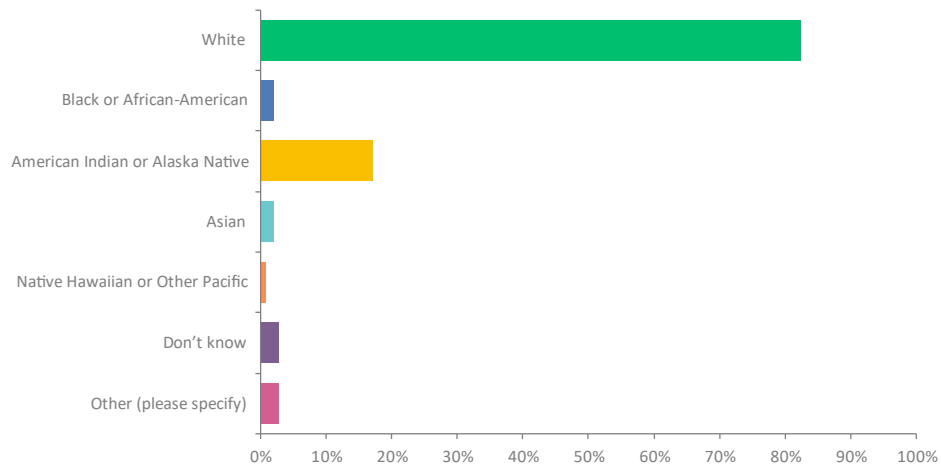

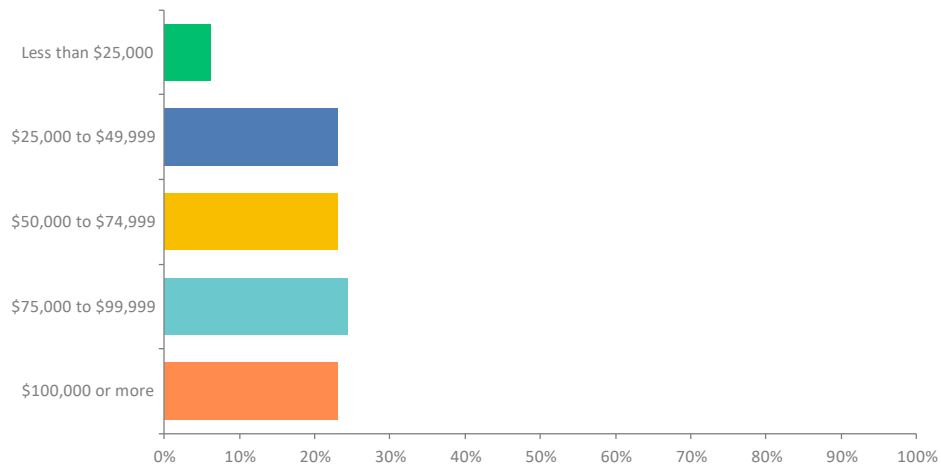
